What do Peer Based Harm Reduction WA do?

Provide health and harm reduction services aimed at:

- Reducing the prevalence of BBVs and STIs
- Preventing overdose deaths
- Reducing the incidence and severity of other harm which may be associated with drug use amongst the community in WA






Unique Needs:


People who inject drugs face a unique set of challenges that set them apart from other populations.

- All illicit drug users are peers BUT not all illicit drug users are treated the same
- Injecting drug users face higher levels of harm and discrimination to non-injectors
- Individuals who inject drugs often face barriers in accessing healthcare services
- By using lived/living experience to inform models of care, we can build more effective and accessible services



Peer Education:

- For many, the same information a health professional would give is easier to trust when it comes from someone with parallel life experience
- Walked the same path, faced similar challenges, overcome similar barriers, speak the same language
- Theoretical knowledge vs real life scenarios. Harm reduction is a spectrum.



We asked 877 people if talking to a peer made a difference...

"Wouldn't have heard the information any other way."

"Wouldn't have spoken to a doctor due to privacy concerns."

"I already feel stigmatised by the system. It felt easier to talk to a peer without fear of judgement."

"Peers are knowledgeable. The information is more appropriate for me."

"I simply don't trust anyone else."





Stigma and Discrimination:

It's not just one or two of us. ALMOST ALL OF US have had bad experiences with health professionals in relation to our drug use.

- The experience of stigma and expectation of inadequate care impacts engagement with services and a person's ability/willingness to open and honest when they do engage.
- By providing services in an informal setting with someone who speaks the same language, we open the door to future engagement. Positive engagement leads to more engagement.
- Peers can empower peers to become self-advocates driving their own well-being.
- Multidisciplinary team lending each other credibility.



Services at PBHRWA and how to access them





Needle and Syringe Exchange Program (NSEP)

- One stop shop
- One for one exchange / purchase / free
- Safe disposal of used equipment
- Printed resources
- Equipment demonstrations
- Referral to other services
- Friendly staff. Many with past/current experience of injecting drug use
- Brief interventions based on issues that consumers present with



Take Home Naloxone

- Learn how to recognise and respond to opioid overdose with naloxone
- Supplied (and resupplied) free of charge
- Brief education session in as little as 5 10 minutes
- Just visit us in Perth, Bunbury or at one of our South West Mobile NSEP sites
- Or call 9325 8387 and ask to speak to the naloxone Project Officer (it's me!)

Health Clinic Services

- Health Clinics co-located at fixed-sites in Perth and Bunbury. No appointment necessary.
- HCV model of care is peer-driven/collaborative
- Mobile Health Clinic Vans available across the Perth Metro area and South West region.
- Free testing and treatment for BBVs & STIs as well as vaccinations and general health care - including pointof-Care testing for HCV and syphilis and venipuncture by peer workers.
- Support from HCV Peer Case Management Workers tailored to individual needs of consumers.



Health Clinic Outreach

- Perth Metro Area and South West Region
- Provides services directly to consumers, wherever they are:
 - regularly at rostered sites at regional services
 - opportunistically at consumers' homes
 - in open community spaces
- Any ongoing follow up provided in the same flexible way






