TITLE: WA OPEN DISCLOSURE POLICY STATEMENT

1. BACKGROUND

WA Health is dedicated and committed to providing safe and high quality health care to all patients. However, despite the best intentions of our highly skilled and committed health professionals occasionally things go wrong. When a patient is harmed in a WA hospital, there is a professional and ethical responsibility on the part of health practitioners to communicate with the patient about the clinical incident that has occurred.

Open disclosure describes the way clinicians communicate with and support patients, and their family and carers, who have experienced harm during health care. Open disclosure is a patient right which is anchored in professional ethics, considered good clinical practice, and is part of the care continuum.

2. POLICY

WA Health's policy is to support and adopt the [Australian Open Disclosure Framework](#) (the Framework). This was developed by the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care after national consultation with stakeholders including consumer, safety and quality and clinician groups, and State governments.

The Framework has been formally endorsed by Australian Health Ministers. It has also been endorsed by the following professional organisations:

- Australian College of Nursing
- Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists
- Royal Australian and New Zealand Colleges of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists
- Royal Australasian College of Physicians
- Royal Australasian College of Surgeons
- Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia

The Framework is supported by the:

- Australasian College of Emergency Medicine
- Royal College of Pathologists of Australia.

4. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Health Service Chief Executives

Health Service Organisations

- Will ensure that their policies, procedures and practices align with the key principles of the Australian Open Disclosure Framework.

All staff to whom this applies

- Will ensure they follow the principles and procedures outlined in the Australian Open Disclosure Framework.

5. COMPLIANCE

Health service organisations are required to comply with open disclosure as part of the National Safety and Quality Health Service Standards (Standard 1: Governance for Safety and Quality in Healthcare Organisations).

6. EVALUATION

Monitoring of compliance with this document is to be conducted through the National Safety and Quality Health Service Standards and the national accreditation scheme.

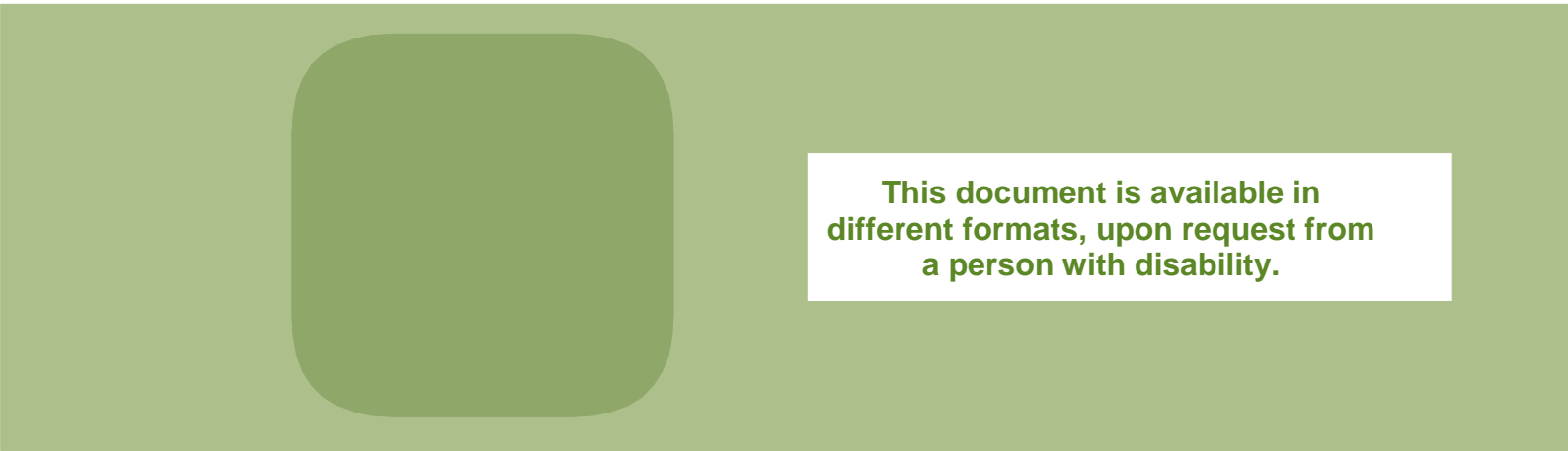

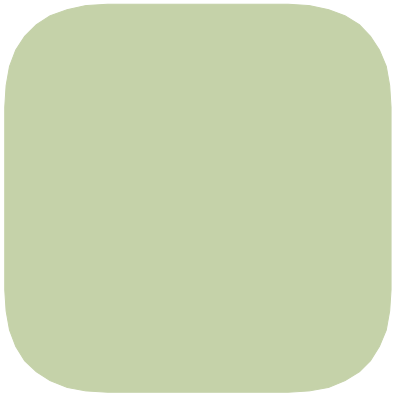
