Peer Based Harm WA is the only peer community-based not for profit Organisation that provides peer-based support, information and education, advocacy and harm reduction services and health services for people who use drugs

>20 years in Western Australia

No medical doctors

Needle syringe exchange program with over 6 million pieces of equipment through 19,000 occasions of service

Outreach services – home delivers NSEP, outreach youth, Overdose Prevention and Management Program, Peer Administered Naloxone Project, Hep C Peer Harm Reduction Education Project



Why do we do outreach

Responding to the needs of a disenfranchised group and their networks Reduce the burden of appointments Improve SVR attendance Recognised community need To provide a positive health experience Spread the word and promote BBV testing and treatments in an unconventional setting

Monthly Mobile NSEP – conduct a clinic in the van – Margaret River, Busselton, Manjimup, Donnybrook Recruitment drives Home deliveries for NSEP Postal service Foot patrol Bunbury health clinic fortnightly Home visits anywhere

Barriers

Patient

Non-return of patients following testing despite numerous follow up attempts

Venous access

Burden of follow up for the patient

Ever changing contact details

Shift in client priorities

Confusion around treatment – eligibility, types of treatment, side effects etc.

Location of fixed site
Limited resources
Lack of collaborative practice with other services

Confusion around treatment – eligibility, types of treatment, side effects etc.

Supporting the

hep C community

- Treated 67 patients
- No treatment failures
- 2 reinfections
- Free service
- Accessing patients who otherwise would not have been treated

Supporting the hep C community

- Patient's feel safe
- Positive health engagement
- More likely to come back for any health problems
- Reduce internalised stigma
- Economic alternative to other health models
- Incorporates harm reduction into health care
- Flexible, client centred approach

Collaboration of the peer workers and other workers in the NSEP, Outreach and other programs at PBHRWA

Support provided by the HCV case management workers in Perth and Bunbury

Flexible approach

Additional support and transport

More than one contact – NP or HCV case management worker
