Pilot WA Public Health Officer Training Program (WAPHOTP) Communique

The pilot WA Public Health Officer Training Program is nearing the mid-way point of its nine month timeframe. After unexpected delays due to COVID-19 surge responses, we have "safe-guarded" the program by pro-actively rostering additional staff in PHEOC to ensure that trainees can attend learning activities.

Whitney Melville started her journey into health in 2007 with a Certificate IV in dental nursing. Since this time Whitney has completed a Bachelor of Health Science majoring in Oral Health Therapy (Curtin University, 2013) and is currently completing both a Graduate Diploma in Health Promotion and a Master of Public Health (Curtin University, 2019). She is currently working part-time as a Dental Hygienist and as a Surveillance Officer at PHEOC.

This journey into public health was impelled by Whitney's desire to learn about the broader aspects influencing health and an opportunity to make a difference in society. Whitney also has a desire to move away from working clinically at the point of care and to get involved with "the bigger picture".
